The well documented continued difficulties with waiting lists within the NHS are creating strong conditions for the private healthcare market with the restrictions on growth primarily arising from capacity and the cost of living issues. Nonetheless, the uncertainties surrounding the timing of treatments, combined with the length of those waiting times are encouraging both increased private medical insurance take-up and growth in the self-pay market.

In 2022, some 272,000 in-patient admissions were self-pay admissions, a strong 37% above the level seen before COVID-19. It would appear that the self-pay sector is gaining major market share, but the proportional importance of self-pay actually fell in 2022.

The government announcement on 4 August 2023 identified increased use of the private sector to tackle the NHS backlog. This includes opening eight privately-run diagnostic centres as well as using new rules to make it easier for the NHS to purchase care from the private sector.

In combination, these factors are offering growth to the sector, and this in turn is attracting growing private equity investment in the sector that comprises some 90 providers including hospitals, clinics, diagnostics and imaging and urgent care. There are reported to have been 150 private equity deals in the UK healthcare sector since 2021.
